Entries need not be affiliated with a school. Artists may be home schoolers, family members, or members of scouts, clubs, or churches in grades 4-8. Students may use watercolor, crayon, pencil, markers, or pen and ink. Posters may be mounted on a second piece of paper for

stabilization, but no 3D is allowed.

CHRISTINA'S CORNER

Garden Checklist for October

It's time for pansies, ornamental kale and cabbage, grasses, gourds, and pumpkins!

- This year, underplant your pansies with spring-blooming blubs for an extended show.
- Try your hand at edibles—most "greens" are coolseason crops that are very easy to grow.
- Some of your choices are lettuce, cabbage, kale, collards, Swiss chard, spinach and broccoli.
- Clean-up your perennials and divide or move any that have become too crowded.
- Any tender bulbs that you wish to keep should be lifted, dried, and stored in a cool area.
- Fall is the perfect time to plant new trees and shrubs, giving them a head-start in spring.
- Be sure to water new plantings deeply and repeat weekly if rain is less than one inch.

It is a great time of the year to visit some of the wonderful nurseries located in Arkansas. We've been cooped up for a long time. We are either avoiding germs or staying out of the heat. Now that we are breathing better when outdoors it's fun to tour some of the nurseries and get some grooming tips and ideas for freshening up our gardens. It is a perfect time to plan and think about the future.

Gathering seeds can be very time consuming. Put some in packets or envelopes, label them, and pass them along to friends. Be sure they Google the variety and find out the best time to plant. Also, find out the proper way to store them for the winter.
